


EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Fund Black Tech seeks to find what is keeping the future Jay-Z or Barack Obama from emerging in tech circles and the public sphere. People know the names Elon Musk and Steve Jobs because they have been covered ad nauseam on television, and the world has seen the fruits of their creations every day. But, humanity has also been greatly enriched by Black minds, which are kept from helping to create the technological revolution that is currently remaking the world.

The story of Black innovation in technology has been pivotal in the past and when given the opportunity, Fund Black Tech will illuminate these stories for a broad audience to learn about and to show the tech world the vast untapped resource that sits in the Black community. This is a fight for social justice of the highest order, not just for the financial rewards of the tech world, which is a modern-day gold rush, which will have seismic changes through generations of communities involved in it. TIMELINE:



AUDIENCE:

Over 70% of the population watches documentaries at least a few times a month, with over 25% watching them at least once a week. We believe this docuseries will have a wide reach, particularly in the 25 to 45 age group.



Episode Summary

Episode 1

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Introducing the Characters

In this episode, we get a brief overview of funding for Black founders, with interviews of Black entrepreneurs who have faced success, or are on the road to it, and the obstacles that they have faced.

Episode 2

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History of Black Entrepreneurship

In this episode, the characters discuss the roots of black entrepreneurship in America, from the days of slavery to the Reconstruction Era to how Jim Crow affected Black business growth. The massacre on Black Wall Street and the systemic racism it was reflective of is discussed in detail.

Episode 3

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Black Women in Tech

In this episode, the characters discuss the issues and barriers unique to Black women in business, particularly in tech. From hair as part of identity and perception, to cultural depictions of Black women, the women of Fund Black Tech discuss their experiences.

Episode 4

Young Entrepreneurs

In this episode, we talk with entrepreneurs who have not yet "arrived", young entrepreneurs who are making their mark, whether coming through incubator programs, or relentlessly persevering to get into the room.

Episode 5

CEO Roundtable

In this episode, we talk with CEOs for a frank discussion on successes and failures in elevating Black voices, and how, in their opinion, founders with great ideas can position themselves to build a business that get attention.

Episode 6

How Successful Entrepreneurs Get Funded

In this episode, the characters who have seen success use hindsight to reflect on how they were able to get funding. We see how successful Black entrepreneurs charted a course to getting into the room, and how they were able to get their ideas funded.

Episode 7

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Pattern Matching and Racism

In this episode, the characters do a systematic breakdown of the big question of "Why". We all know it is happening, but how do the systems of racism in America define who gets funded and who does not.

Episode 8

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Black Entrepreneurs Abroad

In this episode, we look beyond America to see the issues Black founders in Caribbean, African, and other nations face or avoid. At times, the similarities to America are obvious, while at other times, the journey is much different.

Episode 9

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Allies

In this episode, the characters discuss when and how white peers and mentors can impact the journey of Black entrepreneurs, for better or for worse. White CEOs and venture capitalists tell stories of their failures and successes in elevating Black founders.

Episode 10

Perspectives of the Future

In this episode, the characters look ahead to the future of funding Black tech founders. From the rise of VC firms focusing on funding Black founders by Black-led funds to discussing whether movements like Black Lives Matter are creating any change in perspective, and results.

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Future Series

While the primary focus of the series is on the unique journeys and experiences of Black innovators and founders, it is worth acknowledging the shared struggles and triumphs found in other underrepresented groups. The women and Hispanic founders, for instance, also have compelling narratives filled with both challenges and victories. These stories could be explored in potential spin-offs of the series, offering further insights into the diverse dynamics within the entrepreneurial landscape.
